


Lastly, I want to thank Mr. and Mrs. Dendy for sharing their beautiful Dendy ranch with us.



Cheryl Ann (Pelletier) Wenzel, PP, PLS Texas ALP President (2012-2013)

On April 20, 2024, Cheryl Wenzel suddenly passed away at the age of 63. The news of her passing was met with disbelief. It was especially shocking because just two weeks earlier, we had all been with Cheryl at the Texas ALP Annual Education Conference in Waco.

Cheryl was president of Texas ALP for the year 2012-2013, taking her oath of office on Cinco de Mayo 2012 in San Antonio. Cheryl's theme was "Education: One Room Schoolhouse to NALS Certification—How Far We Have Come" and one of the activities for the year was a tour of the one-room schoolhouses of Gillespie County open to both members and their guests.

Cheryl may have been born in Rhode Island but she wholeheartedly embraced everything Texas. The photograph above is of Cheryl and the other members of the EC celebrating her installation at Enchanted Springs Ranch. The other members of that EC—Patti Heaney, Samantha Tandy, Marty Olson, and Mary Bullard—would become the next four presidents of the association and were influenced by Cheryl's leadership.

Cheryl was hard-working, honest, organized, loyal, wise, and kind—especially kind. As her parliamentarian, I was amazed because she <u>never</u> waited until the last minute to do anything. Instead, she began drafting documents months in advance. As an EC, we were especially fortunate because Cheryl believed it was important that everything was shared, so we were literally all on the same page. I will especially miss Cheryl's laughter. She found joy in so many things, whether baking pies for her church, crocheting afghans to raise money for animal shelters, or adopting more cats. She was a true servant.

Cheryl is gone too soon, but she left her imprint on the hearts of the members of Texas ALP and her local chapter, San Antonio LSA, for which she was the longest-serving president.

#### Professional Ethics and the Paralegal<sup>1</sup>

A series of articles will be published in The Texas Docket throughout this fiscal year. This is the first of the series containing ethical information for the legal professional.

#### **Historical Overview**

On October 23, 1981, the State Bar of Texas became the first bar association in the United States to create a separate division for paralegals. One of the first actions taken by the Board of Directors of the Legal Assistants Division (as it was then known) was to adopt a Code of Ethics and Professional Responsibility (the "Code"). The action was ratified by the members at the first Annual Meeting in June 1982. Each applicant for membership agrees to be bound by the Code of Ethics and the Disciplinary Procedures adopted by the Division. Under said agreement, each paralegal is obligated to maintain and perpetuate the highest professional and ethical standards.

#### **Definition of a Paralegal**

In 2005, the State Bar of Texas Board of Directors, and the Paralegal Division of the State Bar of Texas, adopted a new definition for "Paralegal" which is:

A paralegal is a person, qualified through various combinations of education, training, or work experience, who is employed or engaged by a lawyer, law office, governmental agency, or other entity in a capacity of function which involves the performance, under the ultimate direction and supervision of a licensed attorney, of specifically delegated substantive legal work, which work, for the most part, requires a sufficient knowledge of legal principles and procedures that, absent such a person, an attorney would be required to perform the task. (Emphasis added).

That definition of a Paralegal was expanded in Paralegal Standards adopted by the State Bar of Texas in 2006. These Standards can be reviewed at <a href="https://txpd.org/about-pages/texas-paralegal-definition-and-standards/">https://txpd.org/about-pages/texas-paralegal-definition-and-standards/</a>.

So, what is "substantive legal work?" According to the Standards:

"Substantive legal work" includes, but is not limited to, the following: conducting client interviews and maintaining general contact with the client; locating and interviewing witnesses; conducting investigations and statistical and documentary research; drafting documents, correspondence, and pleadings; summarizing depositions, interrogatories, and testimony; and attending executions of wills, real estate closings, depositions, court or administrative hearings, and trials with an

attorney. "Substantive legal work" does not include clerical or administrative work.<sup>2</sup>

#### **Code of Ethics and Professional Responsibility**

#### **Preamble**

Fundamental to the success of any professional organization are the integrity of its members and a high standard of conduct. A Code of Ethics and Professional Responsibility has been promulgated by the Paralegal Division of the State Bar of Texas (adopted March 27, 1982, and amended June 23, 2005).

The canons are intended as a general guide, and the enumeration of the canons does not exclude others of equal importance although not specifically mentioned. The current version of the canons is as follows:

Canon 1. A paralegal shall not engage in the practice of law as defined by statutes or court decisions, including but not limited to accepting cases or clients, setting fees, giving legal advice, or appearing in a representative capacity in court or before an administrative or regulatory agency (unless otherwise authorized by statute, court or agency rules); the paralegal shall assist in preventing the unauthorized practice of law.

- Canon 2. A paralegal shall not perform any of the duties that attorneys only may perform or do things which attorneys themselves may not do.
- Canon 3. A paralegal shall exercise care in using independent professional judgment and in determining the extent to which a client may be assisted without the presence of any attorney and shall not act in matters involving professional legal judgment.
- Canon 4. A paralegal shall preserve and protect the confidences and secrets of a client.
- Canon 5. A paralegal shall not solicit legal business on behalf of an attorney.
- Canon 6. A paralegal shall not engage in performing paralegal functions other than under the direct supervision of an attorney and shall not advertise or contract with members of the general public for the performance of paralegal functions.
- Canon 7. A paralegal shall avoid, if at all possible, any interest or association which constitutes a conflict of interest pertaining to a client matter and shall inform the supervising attorney of the existence of any possible conflict.

Canon 8. A paralegal shall maintain a high standard of ethical conduct and shall contribute to the integrity of the paralegal profession.

Canon 9. A paralegal shall maintain a high degree of competency to better assist the legal profession in fulfilling its duty to provide quality legal services to the public.

Canon 10. A paralegal shall do all other things incidental, necessary, or expedient to enhance professional responsibility and the participation of paralegals in the administration of justice and public service in cooperation with the legal profession.

#### **Professional Ethics Committee**

The Professional Ethics Committee is responsible for interpreting the Division's Code of Ethics and Professional Responsibility, serving as a Grievance Committee, and providing the membership with education on ethical issues. This committee is comprised of a Chairperson and, with the Board of Director's approval, district ad hoc committee members. The Chair and ad hoc committee members are charged with the responsibility of investigating any complaint received against a member of the Division pursuant to the Disciplinary Procedures.

#### Paralegal Ethics Handbook

Authored by the Paralegal Division and published by West, the *Paralegal Ethics Handbook* is a resource for new and experienced paralegals. It includes general ethics information and resources as well as ethics information for specific areas of law. 



#### THANK YOU WACO LPA

#### ACCORDING TO GREGG<sup>i</sup> By Myra Miles, PLS

#### Rule 1061 - Who and Whom

Who is the nominative form. Use who whenever he, she, they, I, or we could be substituted in the who clause. (If in doubt, mentally rearrange the clause as is done in parentheses after each of the following examples.)

<u>Who is arranging</u> the teleconferences? (*She* is arranging the teleconferences.)

Who shall I say is calling? (I shall say he is calling.)

I will speak to *whoever* answers the phone. (*He* answers the phone.)

Gloria is the one who can best do the job. (She can best do the job.)

Whom is the objective form. Use whom whenever him, her, them, me, or us could be substituted as the object of the verb or as the object of a preposition in the whom clause.

Whom did you see today? (You did see her today.)

*To whom* were you talking? (You were talking to *him*.)

<u>Whom</u> were you talking about? (You were talking about him.)

**NOTE:** The humorist Calvin Trillin has said, "As far as I'm concerned, whom is a word that was invented to make everyone sound like a butler." In colloquial speech, most people are likely to say, "Who ya gonna vote for?" rather than "Whom are you going to vote for?" But in a business or academic document, be sure to use whom when the objective form is called for. If whom strikes you as too stilted or sounds unnatural, reword the sentence; for example, "Who is your choice in the next election?"

#### Rule 1062 - Who, Which, and That

Who and that are used when referring to persons. Select who when the individual person or the individuality of a group is meant and that when a class or type is meant.

She is the only one of my managers who can speak Japanese fluently.

He is the kind of student *that* should take advanced math.

Which and that are used when referring to places, objects, and animals. Which is always used to introduce nonessential clauses, and that is ordinarily used to introduce essential clauses.

Laura's report on employee benefits, *which* I sent you last week, should be of some help.

(Which introduces nonessential clause; the report has already been identified.)

The report *that* I sent you last week should be of some help.

(*That* introduces an essential clause; it is needed to identify which report the writer is referring to.)

**NOTE:** Who is now often used when an animal is identified by gender or a pet is identified by name.

It was a chocolate Lab named Luke who located your missing child.

#### Rule 1063 - Whose and Who's

Do not confuse *whose* (the possessive form of *who*) with *who's* (a contraction meaning "who is" or "who has").

Whose house is it? (It is his.) Who's the owner of that house? (She is.)

Who's had the most experience in this position? (She has had the most experience...)

Who's the most experienced person? (She is the most experienced person.)

Whose experience is best suited to that position? (Her experience is.)

#### Rule 1080 – Prepositions at the End of Sentences

Ending a sentence with a preposition is not incorrect. Whether you do so or not should depend on the emphasis and effect you want to achieve.

**INFORMAL:** I wish I knew which magazine her article appeared *in*. **FORMAL:** I wish I knew *in which* magazine her article appeared.

Trying not to end a sentence with a preposition may lead to very awkward results.

**STILTED:** It is difficult to know *about* what you are thinking. **NATURAL:** It is difficult to know what you are thinking *about*.

Short questions and statements frequently end with prepositions.

How many can I count *on?* What is this good *for?* What is this made *of?* We need tools to work *with*.

Where did he come *from*? That's something we must look *into*. You have nothing to worry *about*. That's the car I want to look *at*.

Some sentences end with what seem like prepositions but are really adverbs.

I'm sure another job will turn *up*. When does your plane take *off*?

Sometimes the object of a preposition at the end of a sentence is not expressed.

Although most of our car trips to the West Coast are uneventful, the last one was anything but. (Anything but uneventful.)

Both these examples reinforce the main point:

Use good sense in deciding whether or not to end a sentence with a preposition.

**BETTER THAN:** Use good sense in deciding whether or not to use a preposition to end a sentence with.

#### Rule 1086 – Misplaced Modifiers

Watch out for misplaced modifiers (either words or phrases) that provide the basis for unintended (and sometimes humorous) interpretations.

**WRONG:** I suspect that my assistant accidentally dropped the report I had been drafting in the wastebasket. (What an uncomfortable location in which to draft a report.)

**RIGHT:** The report I had been drafting has disappeared. I suspect that my assistant accidentally dropped it in the wastebasket.

**WRONG:** Here are some helpful suggestions for protecting your valuable possessions from our hotel security staff. (Can no one be trusted?)

**RIGHT:** Here are some helpful suggestions from our hotel security staff for protecting your valuable possessions.

**WRONG:** One of our assistant vice presidents has been referred to a personal finance counselor with serious credit problems. (Would you consult such a counselor?)

**RIGHT:** One of our assistant vice presidents has serious credit problems and has been referred to a personal finance counselor.

**WRONG:** For anyone who has children and does not know it, there is a free after-school program at the Marshfield Community Center.

**RIGHT:** Anyone with children will be glad to know that there is a free after-school program at the Marshfield Community Center.

**WRONG:** Lincoln wrote the Gettysburg Address while traveling to Gettysburg on the back of an envelope.

**RIGHT:** While traveling to Gettysburg, Lincoln wrote the Gettysburg Address on the back of an envelope.

Always remember: When in doubt, check it out.


